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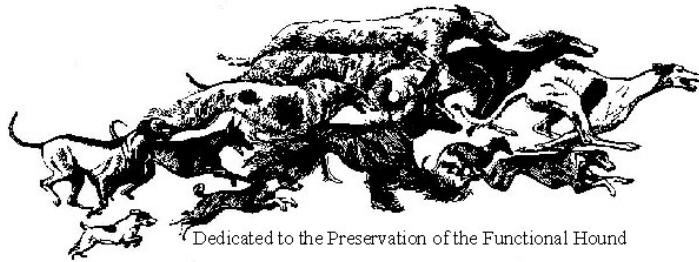

Wally Tate Park

After 3 years the club finally got to run a lure course meeting back at Wally Tate park. There have been a lot of changes to the park, one of the main ones is the excellent viewing of the lure coursing field with people now looking down on the field behind a much better top and bottom rail chain mesh fence, also four new shade areas with seating.

The field is smaller than Ferny Grove but we still manage to put out a 500m course which the dogs really enjoyed.

It was a steep learning curve on the day in how to best use the new area with changes been made as the day went but on the whole the day went really well.

With around 80 dogs there the club got a lot of feed back which we will take to the BCC so we can improve the area for dogs and owners.

The club will get the coffee van back as the canteen there did not have coffee (must have our coffee hit).

There was a lot of helpers making the day go smoothly so the club thanks those people.

The club is looking forward to running more meetings there so keep an eye on our Facebook page for updates.



At the Beginning

In the late Eighties after the club had good enough gear to successfully run a 100 dogs the club started looking around for a suitable place to run lure course meetings as Steve and Sabine Mullers place was no longer available. One of our club members was also the President of the Runcorn pony club and organised for the club to use the pony club's grounds. After a lot of clearing and mowing the horse paddocks where able to be used for lure coursing.

After a couple of meetings there the Pony club asked the club if we wanted to take over the lease for the ground as they had another ground and couldn't really afford two grounds, so we did.

To get a lease on the ground we had to become and incorporated club which we did.

A couple of meetings after the club took over the lease from the pony club a few locals came to a meeting and asked if they could give their dogs a run on the grounds when we won't using them to which we said that would be ok but warned them there were no fences.

At the next Lure course meeting the locals came back and asked if we were going to put any fences up as they had notice we were chasing dogs that ran off as well.

With this in mind our President had the idea of asking the Brisbane city Council to make our car park a off leash dog park hopping to get the council to fence it. The club badly needed the fences as well to stop dogs running off.

So, this was put to council and a meeting was arranged with the councillor of the ward at the grounds. The Councillor attended with a couple of representatives from the BCC. They were very impressed with the idea but said they couldn't approve it as there were no fences and the council wasn't in a position to fence the area.

After much discussion they said they would look at the proposal again if the club fenced the area. The club desperately needed the area fenced so after a special club meeting it was decided to try and fence the area.

Over the next 12 months or so the club members spend many hours cutting hard wood fence post from the bush at a housing development on the coast and a club member with a Bodcat drilled the holes for the fence posts.

With the help of Hay You a produce store way back then the fence was finally finished much to the delight of everyone.

Another meeting was arranged with the Ward councillor and the representatives from the BCC. To say they were very impressed with what the club had done is an understatement.

They approved the dog park and give the club the right to use it and when the Lure coursing club didn't have a meeting on it was an off leash dog area. The councillor and BCC representatives were very happy that the area now was a dual use area and the club had done something for the local people with dogs.

For a few years after that the club would go done the weekend before a meeting and mow the area with ride on and hand mowers. This was done until one time while we were all down at the grounds mowing a Guy from the BCC must have been driving past and called in to see what we were doing, to which he informed us the BCC should be mowing it not us and would see it was done.

Over the next few years, the whole area where the dogs ran was fenced by the club much to the delight of the locals and the fence around the car park (dog of leash area) was gradually improved by the club.

Italian Greyhound



The Italian Greyhound has an ancient lineage dating back more than 2,000 years ago to modern day Greece and Turkey.

Depictions of Italian Greyhounds found on many ancient artifacts and archaeological discoveries of their skeletons confirms their existence during this time. Some claim Italian Greyhounds were used to hunt small game, others claim they were simply used as family pets.

During the sixteenth century, the breed was so popular in Italy that they became known as “Italian Greyhounds”. They were also quite popular in Southern Europe at this time. By the seventeenth century, Italian Greyhounds arrived in England – also becoming a favorite there as well.

Italian Greyhounds were first registered with the American Kennel Club in 1886 and The Italian Greyhound Club of American was founded in 1954.

Height: The height of an Italian Greyhound is 12-15 inches (30-38 cm).

Weight: The weight of an Italian Greyhound is 6-10 pounds (3-5 kg)

Coat Type: The Italian Greyhound's coat is short, fine, glossy and soft all over the body. The coat does not add any protection against the elements, therefore Italian Greyhounds do not like the cold nor do they like swimming. Grooming of the coat is minimal – an occasional bath or wipe down with a damp cloth is all that's necessary. The Italian Greyhound's coat is odorless.

Color: AKC standard: "Any color and markings are acceptable except that a dog with brindle markings and a dog with the tan markings normally found on black-and-tan dogs of other breeds must be disqualified."

Temperament: Italian Greyhounds are docile and very affectionate. They make a great companion dog, love attention and do well with behaved children. Because of their small size, rough play should be avoided since injury could result. Italian Greyhounds are intelligent and training is generally easy, however, it should be done in a firm, yet gentle and consistent manner. House training can be challenging. These dogs must always recognize his owner as his pack leader, otherwise there may be behavioral problems. Italian Greyhounds are eager to please and thrive on attention. They are alert, usually aloof with strangers and will bark at them and at unfamiliar sounds – making them an acceptable watch dog. Italian Greyhounds are incredibly fast, agile and athletic. When it comes to exercise, daily walks as well as free play are essential. It's important to note that due to their coat which does not add any protection against the elements, Italian Greyhounds are not outdoor dogs. They do not like the cold and they will cuddle up to to you or under blankets even on the warmest of days. In addition, they do not like getting their feet wet at all.

Health Problems: Italian Greyhounds are generally healthy. The biggest health concern involves their teeth and gums. It is imperative for proper and preventive care to help avoid this issue, otherwise, the likelihood of developing periodontal disease is extremely great – even at a young age. Other health concerns include: fractures, hypothyroidism, idiopathic epilepsy, progressive retinal atrophy (PRA), luxating patellas and Legg-Perthe's disease (LPD). Life expectancy of a Italian Greyhound is between 12-15 years.
